# EXCERPT FROM THE STATEMENT BY THE NORTHERN BISHOPS ANNOUNCING THAT PUBLIC WORHSIP MAY RESUME IN NORTHERN IRELAND FROM FRIDAY 26<sup>th</sup> MARCH

- Bishops in the North announce a cautious return to public worship for the faithful from Friday 26th March, in time for the celebration of Holy Week and Easter.
- Bishops emphasise the need for continued caution and a rigorous application of all mitigations and safeguards required to ensure the safest possible return to public worship in our Churches.
- Every person should consider carefully if returning to collective worship is the safe and appropriate step for them, at this time. Families are encouraged to join those celebrating the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus in Churches, from the 'domestic church' of their own living rooms, via live-streaming.
- Bishops, together with other Church leaders, encourage all on Easter Sunday to pray and reflect in a spirit of remembering, solidarity and hope in the context of the current pandemic.

#### Amendments to the Liturgies of Holy Week will be required.

This year the celebration of Holy Week and Easter will also require adjustments to certain aspects of the liturgy to take account of the need for safe social distancing, sanitising and other mitigations necessary in the context of the current pandemic. Guidelines for the Liturgies of Holy Week in a time of pandemic will be issued separately to parishes over coming days. We strongly encourage families to participate from the "domestic churches" of their living rooms and join with those who are gathering in their local churches in commemorating the Passion, Death and Resurrection of the Lord this Easter.

#### The Good Friday collection for the Holy Land and other charitable initiatives.

Throughout the pandemic, our Parishes have provided a real life-line of hope and solidarity to many in our local communities, including some of the most vulnerable. The joyful message of Easter inspires us to continue to reach out to those in greatest need around us at this time. We therefore ask families and individuals to bring the light of hope to others this Easter by making a particular effort to support the charitable needs of their local parish and by highlighting in a particular way this year the traditional Good Friday collection expressing our solidarity with

fellow Christians in the Holy Land. We also draw attention to the ongoing and ever-increasing demands on the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul and Trócaire, who will welcome much needed contributions as they have been unable to raise funds in the normal way during the pandemic.

#### A time of mercy and healing.

We are also conscious that Holy Week and Easter are a time when, traditionally, many people ask for in a particular way God's forgiveness and for healing of spirit. Although it may not be possible for all who wish to, to safely avail of the sacrament of Reconciliation, we strongly encourage all the faithful to confidently renew their trust in God's mercy at this sacred time of the year through an Act of Perfect Contrition.

#### A time of solidarity and hope!

As we continue our journey through the season of Lent in preparation for Easter, we strongly encourage the faithful to bring the intentions of all those impacted by Covid19 to the Lord's care in prayer and petition. We are particularly conscious of those whose livelihoods have been seriously threatened by the pandemic. We keep in mind people who are coping with bereavement, families that cannot be together, those in care homes who can only have limited visits from their loved ones. The Easter period will also be difficult for Irish emigrants and migrants living in Ireland, who are unable to travel home. We pray that the time will come very soon when loving connections between families and friends can be fully restored.

On Easter Sunday, we will join with Christians of all traditions in offering special prayers of intercession for those impacted by Covid-19 and provide moments for our entire society to reflect together, in a spirit of hope, on the challenges of the past year arising from the global pandemic. Until then, we continue to journey in the confident hope that the efforts of all those working hard to provide the circumstances in which all sectors of our society can re-open safely will soon bear fruit



Reflection on today's Gospel: John 12:20-33

If a grain of wheat falls on the ground and dies, it yields a rich harvest.

Today's Gospel teaches us a fundamental Christian truth which gloriously liberates the soul but may strike fear in the timorous heart: death is a prerequisite of life. If there is no Good Friday, there is no Easter Sunday. Death of any kind is a subject from which most of us shy away. We know that we are mortal creatures, but we often live as though our time on earth is unlimited, as though we will live forever. We may know that there are aspects of our lives to which we must die if we are to thrive and prosper in the light of God and bear good fruit, but we procrastinate over and over, telling ourselves that we have plenty of time before letting those aspects fall into the earth and die.

In today's Gospel Jesus speaks to us in the knowledge that he is standing in the shadow of his forthcoming Passion and death. He is the grain of wheat which will fall on the ground and die in order to yield the rich harvest of humanity's salvation; in order to open the door to eternal life for all who believe in him. His death will call us to eternal life. Good Friday lights the way to Easter Sunday.

Jesus, as we stand in the light of your Passion and death may we have the courage to face and let fall to the ground to die those aspects of ourselves which prevent us from yielding good fruit. In the light of our knowledge that final death calls us to eternal life, may we live our lives fully, gratefully and bravely, and may we develop and share with others the gifts of compassion and genuine kindness as we sojourn through our allotted span.

Stations of the Cross Remembrance Vigil in St Eugene's Cathedral on Friday, 26th March beginning at 9.00 pm and continuing until Mass on Saturday morning at 4.00 am. Bishop McKeown will lead a prayerful remembrance of all who have died in our diocese since the start of the pandemic. The Vigil will be built round the Stations of the Cross and the names from each parish will be read out. As the names are read out, a rose plant will be brought forward to the Sanctuary in the name of each parish. These roses will, at a later stage, be planted in a planned Garden of Remembrance in the grounds of St Eugene's Cathedral.

Garden of Remembrance for those who died during the Covid 19 pandemic restrictions: In memory of all those in the Derry Diocese who died during the Covid 19 pandemic restrictions, a Garden of Remembrance will be created behind the Grotto in the grounds of St Eugene's Cathedral where 51 rose bushes will be planted to remember those who died from each parish in the Derry Diocese during the pandemic restrictions.

Palm Sunday (28th March) at 8.15 pm here in St Eugene's Cathedral: "A man of sorrows and acquainted with grief." (From Messiah by Handel). A moving journey through the Passion of Christ in Scripture, reflection and song, performed by young people of the Diocese of Derry.
