Excerpt from Statement by the Catholic Bishops of Northern Ireland:

"As many people as possible stay at home for the sake of health, life and the Common Good"

"Faith and prayer can be a tremendous support to individuals and society during these difficult times"

In light of our ongoing consultations and of the current serious and worsening situation, and in line with clear public health guidance that people should *stay at home*, we have decided that for a limited period (from midnight on Thursday, 7th January until Saturday, 6th February 2021, subject to review in late January), the celebration of the Eucharist and other liturgies should take place without the physical presence of the faithful - with the exception of marriage, funeral, baptismal liturgies and drive-in services (subject to regulations). Arrangements for recording and/or livestreaming, and making individual visits for private prayer are also permissible in accordance with regulations. We encourage parishes, where possible, to continue to broadcast the celebration of Mass - and other devotions and prayer services - online and on other media, knowing that faith and prayer can be a tremendous support to individuals and society during these difficult times.

We make this decision reluctantly, conscious that not being able to gather for public worship can cause pain for all the faithful, but in the hope that this limited period of sacrifice will be for the protection of life and health and for the greater good of all. We once more ask for prayers for the sick, the bereaved and all those whose livelihoods have been particularly impacted by the pandemic. We keep in our prayers all health workers, carers, chaplains and other essential workers. We welcome the announcement that a similar position is being taken by the leaders of the Church of Ireland, the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, the Methodist Church in Ireland and many other denominations and faith communities in response to the unequivocal message from public health authorities that as many people as possible stay at home at this time.



Reflection on today's Gospel: Mark 1: 14-20

I will make you into fishers of men

John's work is done; Jesus' work has begun and, significantly, his message echoes the message of John: 'Repent, and believe the Good News.'

John has carried out his ministry of repentance and salvation far from any seat of earthly power, choosing instead the wilderness as his pulpit, locusts and wild honey as his staple diet, animal skins to cover his nakedness. He is 'the thing itself', 'unaccommodated man'.

Today's Gospel witnesses Jesus gathering about him his first disciples. He doesn't seek them out among the rich and powerful, nor among the sophisticated and highly educated; instead he seeks out ordinary men, fishermen, men who work hard to earn a living. The word 'respect' means 'to look again' and this second look is deemed to see beyond the superficial first look to the less visible truth of a person. Jesus always looked again. He always saw the truth which lies in the human heart. Here he sees the purity of heart of these simple fishermen. He sees their true worth, and their true worth has nothing to do with earthly power or sophistication. He recognises their truth and they recognise his truth.

Jesus, may we always take the time and effort to 'look again' and seek the true worth of those around us rather than indulge in superficial judgements.

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 18th to 25th January: The Annual Week of Prayer for Christian Unity will finish tomorrow (Monday, 25th January). The theme this year is "Abide in my love and you shall bear much fruit", based on John 15:1-17. The resources for this year have been provided by the Monastic Community of Grandchamp in Switzerland. Obviously, the Covid-19 pandemic has limited our options for marking this week in 2021 but we are encouraged to pray together in our homes and, if possible, via online means.
